Review of the Asian Network Activities and Objectives of the Workshop

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Background Information

- There is an increasing concern in Asian countries about transboundary movement (TBM) of hazardous wastes
- Some hazardous wastes are illegally imported/exported and may be treated in the environmentally unsound manner, which causes the adverse effects to human health and the environment, especially in developing countries
- For the purpose of obtaining appropriate control on such illegal shipments, the establishment of the "Asian Network for Prevention of Illegal Transboundary Movement of Wastes" has been proposed by the Government of Japan in 2003
- A project for establishing the Network has been acknowledged by Parties at the First Session of the Open-ended Working Group of the Basel Convention (OEWG1) in 2003

- December 7-8, 2004 in Tokyo
- 26 participants from 9 countries, one region, and two Basel Convention Regional Centers (BCRC) (Cambodia, Indonesia, Japan, Republic of Korea, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam, Hong Kong SAR, BCRC China, and BCRC-SEA)
 - Shared experience and difficulties of each country
 - Agreed TOR of the Asian Network
 - Discussion on the sitemap of AN website







Review of AN Workshop -2005-

- November 23, 2005 in Tokyo Back-to-back inception workshop on ESM of E-waste in AP region
- 22 participants from 9 countries, one region, and 2 BCRCs
- 7 observers (SBC, Australia, researchers, etc)
 - Shared updated information on regulation
 - Trend of TBM
 - Criteria on secondhand EEE and E-waste







Review of Regional Workshop -2007-

- March 28-29, 2007 in Beijing
- Organized by BCRC China, with support from SEPA of China and MOE of Japan
- 35 participants from 10 countries and one region
- 25 observers (SBC, IMPEL-TFS, Netherlands, RILO/AP, etc)
 - Information exchange on updated waste regulations
 - Definition of waste/non-waste
 - Regional demand for IEC network







Review of AN Workshop -2008-

- January 28-30, 2008 in Tokyo
- 27 participants from 11 countries, one region and 2 BCRCs (Brunei Darussalam was <u>newly</u> invited)
- 14 observers (SBC, Canada, IMPEL-TFS, UNEP/ROAP, etc)
 - Update on implementing activities of the Basel Convention
 - Criteria for new, secondhand, and waste
 - Good practices for the implementation
 - Future projects of the Asian Network








Review of AN Workshop -2009-

- January 20-22, 2009 in Kuala Lumpur
- Co-organized by BCRC-SEA and MOEJ, with support from DOE of Malaysia
- 26 participants from 11 countries, one region and 2 BCRCs
- 6 observers (SBC, IMPEL-TFS, researchers / consultants, etc)
 - Good practices for effective implementation
 - Asian situation in TBM of hazardous wastes
 - Toward ESM of Secondhand EEE and E-wastes









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Projects under the Asian Network

Research project on the import/export control of used EEE and E-waste (completed in 2009)

A research on definitions and criteria of secondhand EEE and Ewaste was conducted by BCRC China for better understanding of differences in rules and regulations of each country

Electronic notification and performance pledge

In order to accelerate notification process, it was agreed upon by network members in the workshop 2009 to send notification electrically through fax or email as well as by post. A performance pledge for the notification processing time was also set by each country

E-handbook for good practices

In the workshop 2009, Development of a web-based handbook was agreed to keep sharing good practices of implementation activities of the Basel Convention among member countries for enhancing the overall enforcement capability of the region

- Many traders complain the lengthy and unpredictable process of Basel notification and consent receipt
- Speedy and user-friendly import/export procedures may promote legal transactions, resulting in reducing illegal trade

<Area of improvement>


- Mailing notification sometimes takes more than one week by postal delay...
- Internal processing of import/export application is sometimes slow ...

Brief Review of the Workshop 2009

- Some participants proposed <u>a promoted dialogue and</u> <u>collaboration with customs officers in the future AN workshop</u> while bearing in mind the existing initiative by UNEP/ROAP for the MEA Regional Enforcement Network
- Participants agreed to <u>develop a web-based handbook for</u> <u>good practice (E-handbook) to keep sharing good practices</u> among member countries for enhancing the overall enforcement capability of the region
- Participants recognized that <u>clear definitions and strict border</u> <u>control on illegal import/export of disguised secondhand EEE</u> <u>and E-wastes</u> were vital for combating environmentally unsound practices

- Theme of the Workshop 2010
 - Reinforced collaboration of Customs and Competent Authorities of the Basel Convention
- Based on the theme, the workshop <u>newly</u> invites:
 - 9 customs officers from 8 countries and one region,
 - General Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine (AQSIQ), China
 - World Customs Organization (WCO) and Regional Intelligence Liaison Office for Asia and the Pacific (RILO/AP)
 - International Criminal Police Organization (INTERPOL)
 - United States
