


International Coral Reef Initiative (ICRI)



10 YEARS OF ICRI

ICRI was established in 1994 when an estimated 10 % of all coral reefs had already been seriously degraded. In 1998 coral bleaching affected ¾ of the world's reefs leading to the mortality of 16% of reefs. Since its foundation ICRI has provided advice and guidance to the international community on a wide range of issues with the aim of reversing coral reef degradation. Such issues include the aquarium trade, marine protected areas, destructive fishing, monitoring of seagrass and mangrove ecosystems, trade on coral reef species and the importance of coral reefs to Small Island Developing States.
