- MCED serves as a Forum for:
 - Assessment of the State of the Environment;
 - Formulation of Policy and Strategic Response to imperatives posed by important Global Forums;
 - Synthesis of Regional Perspectives;
 - Formulations of Priorities and forward-looking Agendas

The 5th MCED 2005

- 24-29 March, Seoul, Republic of Korea
- Forum of ENV & <u>Development</u>: not only of Environment: **should aim to integrate Environment** & **Economy**
- Basis for action:
 - Increasing Pressure on Environmental Sustainability from Economic Growth

MCED 2005 - Paradigm Shift

- From "Growth First and Clean Up later"
 - → to a new paradigm of "Green Growth" (leapfrog)
- Environment: from extra cost/constraint to economy
 - → to Business Opportunity / Driver of Economic Growth
 - → Integration of Environment & Economy/ Mutually Reinforcing Interaction
- Introduce Demand-side Management: Consumption Pattern (licensing purchase of car, Railroad VS Highway, energy/water efficiency VS Power plants/dams etc.)
