

In response to the accident at TEPCO's Fukushima Daiichi NPS, countries and regions all over the world imposed various measures on imports from Japan. However, as a result of all-out efforts by the government of Japan, such regulatory measures have been lifted or eased (out of the 55 countries and regions that imposed measures, 43 lifted measures, while 12 continue imposing them).

The number of countries or regions imposing measures has decreased from 55 immediately after the accident to 12.

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
