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
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Kutcharo Lake, Hokkaido Home to thousands of migratory swans - explore in a private reserve

The northern tip of Hokkaido is rarely visited, even by the Japanese nationals, because it appears to be a vast plain of nothingness. In fact, most travelers are not aware of what they are missing - pristine nature.

Lake Kutcharo is a permanent freshwater lake **Bewick's** re**Swans** 7km; however, it is a rare water bird sanctuary that supports the largest Bewick's Swan population in Japan and was designated a Ramsar site in 1989 (wetlands of international importance). What even the local people do not know is that a large portion of the untouched land is owned by private parties. Working with a local NGO for conservation and ecotourism, **Conservation NGO** y only a few selected individuals who agree to abide by the codes of conduct, respecting nature and the local culture. Its blessings of nature are unspoken to the outer world and should be kept this way to minimize impacts from human interactions.

The highlights of this destination are not limited to the protected natural area. You will have a chance to visit the town as the guests of friends. If you like cooking, you can harvest the local surf and turf ingredients for a dinner hosted by the community. For cultural interaction, staying overnight in a local Zen temple is now possible, (subject to availability), definitely something beyond what normal travelers experience.

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

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
Hiwasa, Tokushima IMMERSE YOURSELF IN A LOCAL COMMUNITY AND ENJOY PRIME ADVENTURE Loggerhead seaturtle Nesting Ground

Hiwasa is the sleepy fishing village with a well-protected beach where turtle often come to nest during spring and summer. Stroll through the town past traditional minka houses, making stops at places of interest, i.e. sweets shop, seafood store, artisan's gallery, etc. When you are tired of walking, there is a natural hot spring footbath next to a market where locals gather to chat and catch up with stories. For energetic individuals, join a weekly Awa-odori folk dance practice at the municipal hall. Within a stone's throw, there is a Hilltop Yakuoji (deity of medicine) temple, home to worshipers and day visitors making their 28th stop on the 88-temple pilgrimage circuit henro; that pilgrims have follwed since the early 800s in the hope to expel evil spirits and misfortune. Due to its proximity to the ocean and mountains, numerous adventurous opportunities are available to sate the visitors' curiosity in exploring the area. Sea kayaking along the rocky shore with 'paddle-thru' natural arches, mountain biking in town or in the woods, trekking along a photogenic coastal trail... these are just among a few of the adventures that Hiwasa offers.

This area is also a food lovers' paradise. Sample today's catch and locally grown organic vegetables prepared with a touch of local seasonings in more-than-a-century-old private dining establishment. Our traditional style inns boast straw-mat tatami rooms that are cleverly positioned to allow you to luxuriate within view of a Japanese garden. Weather and season permitting, local farmers assist you in planting and harvesting rice and seasonal vegetables in a lush-green valley.

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Masuda, Shimane PROUD OF RURAL JAPAN - NATURE, CULTURE, AND HISTORY HAS IT ALL!

We have been developing eco-rural tourism product for years with the local community of Sumi in Masuda, Shimane. This small rice-farming community lies next to one of the clearest rivers, Takatsu River, and the community faces a number of social issues: 1) the younger generation drifts out to the cities 2) limited income as less and less rice and rice products are eaten in Japan 3) high-aging society and depopulation



These issues are leading to serious degradation in the surrounding

environment, Satoyama, and to traditional rituals such as Kagura, (Shinto music and dance). The community does not desire a silent ending of the village; rather it endeavors to host travelers as if they were their family members, not just the guests.

This area is the least visited in all of Japan by overseas travelers; thus, the cultural authenticity is intact and vivid. The community members will perform the sacred dance in a lush ancient shrine just for you, and a tea ceremony will be held at an old private house with a historically valued dry stone garden that is closed to the public. The majority of what you pay will stay in the local area for your food and drinks, employment, and conservation of the river that their life is dependent.

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
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World Natural Heritage Ogasawara National Park

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Ogasawara Islands THE GALAPAGOS OF THE ORIENT - NATIVE SPECIES PARADISE

The Ogasawara Islands were added to UNESCO list of World Natural Heritage sites in July 2011. Flora and fauna there have undergone unique evolutionary processes, because these islands have never been connected with a continent, and thus are often dubbed the GALAPAGOS OF THE ORIENT.

These islands are only accessible by a 25-hour boat ride, with additional hours during rough weather. Visitors must be committed to staying a minimum of 5 days including the 2-day boat ride. We will kindly ask you to follow the codes of conduct set by the local government to help conserve the nature on the islands.

The activities are season- and weather-dependent, however, whale watching, dolphin swims, seakayaking, and scuba diving are known to be one among the best in Japan. Land activities include
