Brunei and the Basel Convention





Legal Requirement

Hazardous Waste (Control Of Export, Import And Transit) Order, 2013

To provide for the regulation of the export, import and transit of hazardous waste and other waste i.e. to implement the obligations of the Basel Convention Hazardous waste is defined as:

- i. Waste has any of the characteristics mentioned in Annex III to the Basel Convention; or
- Waste that belongs to any category contained in Annex I to the Basel Convention, unless it does not possess any of the characteristics contained in Annex III to the Convention

Other waste is defined as:

- i. Household waste; or
- ii. Residue arising from the incineration of household waste

Control of Plastic Waste TBM



Exportation of plastic wastes is in accordance with the Basel Convention requirements and the importing countries' national legislations and requirements

Importation of all types of plastic waste is **not allowed**

On-going and Future Efforts





Amending existing legislations

DEPR is in the process of finalizing the amendment to the Hazardous Waste (Control of Export, Import and Transit) Order, 2013:

 to include the requirements of the Basel Convention plastic waste amendments DEPR is working closely with the Royal Customs and Excise Department

Establishing communication with relevant agencies

- (RCED):Notification of the
 - Plastic Waste Amendments
- Revising the SOP for plastic waste exportation
- Joint inspection

Developing guidelines on the TBM of plastic wastes Raising awareness among traders

To strengthen the domestic implementation of the BC plastic waste amendments, DEPR is in the initial stage of developing technical guidelines on the export/import of plastic wastes. Efforts to raise awareness among recyclers, exporters and forwarders and make them well informed include:

- Organising information sharing and Q&A sessions
- Making information related to plastic waste amendments and export/import procedures available on website and other media platforms.



Understanding of BC Plastic Terminology



• Difficulty to interpret the terminology of the Annexes

 Identification of controlled/regulated plastic waste by relevant implementing agencies

Solutions

- By benchmarking and making comparison of other countries' interpretation and/or guidelines on the terminology, and available international guidelines on quality standards for plastic recycling.
- To conduct a workshop so as to provide other relevant implementing agencies such as Custom's Department an understanding of the different types of controlled/regulated waste plastic

to include the requirements of the Basel Convention Ewaste amendments Developing guidelines on the TBM of E-wastes

Raising awareness among traders

To strengthen the domestic implementation of the BC E-waste amendments, DEPR will develop the necessary guidelines on the import and export of E-waste to assist the private sector. Efforts to raise awareness among recyclers, exporters and forwarders and make them well informed include:
