Welcome to Shinjuku Gyoen National Garden

The present site of Shinjuku Gyoen was originally one part of Edo residence of the Lord Naito, the vassal of levasu Tokugawa. In the Meiji era, it became an agricultural experiment station, and then in 1906 it was made into an imperial garden. After the war in 1949, it was opened to the public as a national garden. The garden contains three styles, Landscape Garden, Formal Garden, and Japanese Traditional Garden, and is considered to be one of the most important



Kyu-Goryo-Tei is a building given by Japanese people in Taiwan to commemorate the wedding of Crown Prince Hirohito, who became Emperor

Showa. The building was originally designed to cool off while walking in the garden during summer, and you can feel cool breeze while looking at the Japanese garden. It is particularly recommended to visit here during cool time in a day, such as early morning or in the evening.

Season when bees become active

At Shinjuku Gyoen, the maximum size of beehives can be found in August and September. Bees generally attack people to protect their hives or when they feel threatened. Please beware of the following 4 things.



Do not ward off bees with your hands.



Do not go into wooded areas or bushes.

Be careful if you wear dark clothing or anything that has a strong smell.




