UN Environment promotes the worldwide implementation of Sustainable Public Procurement (SPP), a powerful instrument that has the ability to accelerate the <u>shift</u> to more sustainable <u>consumption</u> and <u>production practices</u>.

Through its various projects, UN Environment supports the <u>development</u> <u>and implementation of SPP policies in</u> 13 countries and fosters <u>regional</u> cooperation and exchange of know-how in Latin America and Asia Pacific.

UN Environment is also the lead of the **10YFP SPP programme**, an international collaborative platform that aims at making the case for SPP and supporting all organizations on SPP implementation.

What is Green Public Procurement (GPP)?

A process whereby public authorities seek to procure goods, services and works with a <u>reduced environmental impact</u> throughout their <u>life cycle</u> when compared to goods, services and works with the same primary function that would otherwise be procured.



... the process whereby organizations meet their needs for goods, services, works and utilities in a way that achieves "value for money on a whole life basis" in terms of generating benefits not only to the organization, but also to society and the economy, whilst minimizing, and if possible avoiding, damage to the environment












Policy framework supporting SPP

- However, it needs a strong and enabling political and legal framework



































What type of sustainability issues are addressed by SPP policies? Most national governments have SPP commitments that cover both environmental and socio-economic issues. 74% Focus on BOTH environmental and socio-economic issues. Focus ONLY on environmental issues The focus is still prominently on environmental issues, but socio-economic ones are increasingly taken into account.














CONCLUSIONS

Conclusions

The 2016 Global Review highlights how SPP is becoming a widespread practice. Many national governments are shifting their SPP policies towards strategic procurement policies - where sustainability is one of several "pillars" or goals.

SP activities are on the rise in all types of organizations – including local governments, non-profits and private sector companies, both large and small

Successful SPP requires a solid policy foundation, toplevel leadership support and excellence in implementation.

Conclusions

Still considerable work to be done before sustainability considerations become regular criteria within bid specifications and contracts.

SPP goes beyond "picking greener products" and encompasses activities at every step of the procurement cycle

SDGs and target 12.7 provides and opportunity to formulate a more standard definition and articulation of SPP practices and measures that will help in measuring progress and encourage adoption.

Transforming sustainable production and consumption patterns will require collaboration among all stakeholders along the supply chain





SPP in Colombia: Implementation Activities

- Integration in the management and procurement-related procedures and processes
 SPP framework agreements conducted by Colombia Compra Eficiente;
 SPP integration in the Procurement Manual of the Ministry of the
 Environment and Sustainable Development
 - at present in **five contracts** and work is being undertaken to include them in **three** other framework contracts.
- Provision of SPP criteria and guidelines have been defined by taking into consideration the life-cycle perspective as well as the market readiness, existence of eco-labelling systems and expected impacts. They are voluntary and are available online
- SPP training provided by the Ministry of the Environment and Sustainable Development in-person as well as online both at national and regional level. At the central government level, Environmental Interministerial Agendas include SPP-related issues. In 2013, training was provided to more than 40 regional public organisations.
